IRON COUNTY FAIR EXHIBITS RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. The Exhibit Management reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations to settle and determine all matters, questions, and differences that may arise thereof.
- 2. The Exhibit Management is not responsible for loss or damage by any cause whatsoever to exhibits while on display or en route to or from the Fair. The Management will use the utmost care to secure the safety of articles after their arrival and placement. Coordinators and judges reserve the right to change items from one class to another if they deem the article is better suited in another category.
- 3. NO FOOD OR DRINKS allowed in the Exhibit Hall.
- 4. Exhibitors must be residents of Iron County.
- 5. Articles must be delivered to the Exhibit Hall at the Iron County Fairgrounds at the appropriate time. Please check the Schedule of Events listing.
- 6. All items entered for competition must be the exhibitors' handiwork or raised by them.
- 7. Soiled, damaged, poorly pressed, or unblocked articles will not be accepted. Items must be clean and in excellent condition.
- 8. Due to the Fair's family-oriented atmosphere, items containing questionable themes will be rejected. This includes, but is not limited to, nudity, satanic, cult or gang themes.
- 9. All articles for judging must have been completed within 18 months prior to Fair opening and not exhibited in any other Fair before.
- 10. An exhibitor may enter two (2) articles in any class or one item per category, within section guidelines.
- 11. Any modification of entry rules due to unusual circumstances will be approved by the Exhibit Director.
- 12. There will be a section for DISPLAY ONLY in all departments. This section will not be judged for prizes.
- 13. PRO-AM for serious amateurs or semi-experienced, who may make a limited income through their craft. PROFESSIONAL open to those making at least half of their livelihood through their craft. No Business Cards Accepted.
- 14. Printed copy of entries MUST BE presented when articles are claimed and signed for at the close of the Fair. These can be printed off after you have entered all your exhibits or through your exhibitor online account.
- 15. All sections will be broken down into Super Senior, Senior Citizen, Adult, Junior, & Children Super Senior, Senior, Adult & Junior are the same premium (13+). Child premiums are designated separately (12-).

Super Senior: 81 years & older (13+) Senior: 65-80 years (13+) Adult: 19-64 years of age (13+) Junior: 13-18 years of age (13+)

Children: 12 years & younger (12-)

16. The Danish System of judging will be used. The judges will not award a premium unless the article is deemed worthy of merit. If an article is not worthy of a blue ribbon, or other special award, the judges may award second or third or no ribbon, according to their judgment. Sweepstakes will only be awarded when merited. Judging sheets will be used in all departments and given to the exhibitor. Types of things a judge looks for are (not all in every category): Workmanship, Design, Beauty, Originality, Suitability to Article, Harmony of Color, Cleanliness, Appearance, Shape, Golden Brown Crust, Tenderness, Texture or Flavor.

SPECIAL RULES FOR HOME CANNING

Canning rules are based on safe food preservation guidelines from approved sources (National Center for Home Food Preservation - NCHFP, USU Extension and Pacific Northwest Extension, USDA, and Ball Canning). See http://nchfp.uga.edu/, http://extension.usu.edu/canning/, or http://www. freshpreserving.com/.

- 1. Only products of home kitchens are eligible.
- 2. Products entered must have been prepared (by the person entering them) since the last state/county fair. Older products will not be accepted.
- **REQUIRED:** All jars must be labeled and attached to the bottom of jar. If sweeteners other than sugar are used, include on label. Labels are available in advance from USU Extension Office or on the

4. All entries must be in clean, standard canning jars (e.g. no Mayo jars, small size baby food jars or colored jars) with new, single-use, two-piece metal lids and rings

- 5. A one-quart or pint jar constitutes an exhibit for fruit, vegetables or meat
- 6. One standard-size canning jar constitutes an exhibit for preserves, conserves, pickles, and relishes
- 7. One pint or 1/2 pint jar with lid constitutes an exhibit for jellies and jams
- 8. Exhibits should be processed using safe canning methods. Good examples of Utah State-tested recipes would include: USDA, Ball, pectin brand name or NCHFP guidelines. Processing adjustments for altitude, time or pressure must be made and explained.
- 9. All fresh fruits, jams, jellies, pickles and relishes must be processed in a boiling water bath and properly sealed. Entries processed in a steam canner will not be accepted.
- 10. No frozen jams or wax seals will be accepted. The presence of mold disqualifies a product.
- 11. All meats and vegetables must be processed in a pressure canner
- 12. The exhibitor is requested to loosen the ring on the jar (so judges can remove ring and examine the head space)
- 13. Exhibitors are limited to 20 total exhibits in Canning

- 8. The name of the variety of each entry should be included on the entry tag. Examples: Blue Lake Bush Beans, Kentucky Wonder Beans, or Blue Lake Pole Beans
- 9. Classes for varieties not listed will be determined by Section Coordinators and will be judged for merits and prize
- 10. The minimum quantity required for each entry is

SUGGESTIONS FOR PREPARATION AND CARE OF FLOWERS:

- 1. Flowers should be gathered before sunrise or after sunset.
- 2. Cut succulent flower stems with sharp knife, brittle stems are best broken.
- 3. Cut flowers with long stems generally just before they come into full bloom (exceptions are: Gladiolas, pick when first bud opens; Roses, pick when buds are soft; Poppies, the night before they open; and Dahlias, pick when blooms are fully open).
- 4. Place flowers in room temperature water up to flower heads right after cutting, then store in a dark place, which is free of drafts.
- 5. Salt, aspirin, etc., do not prolong the life of the flowers.
- 6. When taking to the place of exhibition, wrap flowers in moist newspaper and place in a watertight container. **Do not over-water your exhibit**, please only water 1/2 way. If water is needed, the department head will make sure your exhibit has enough water.



- 1. Entry dates and times All 4-H non-food exhibit articles which are to be exhibited in the project areas included in this department should be brought to the USU Extension Office (585 N. Main Street #4, Cedar City). Non-food exhibits will be accepted starting July 28, 2025, at 8:00am and ending August 22, 2025, at 5:00pm. 4-H Food exhibits (including flowers or gardening exhibits) will be accepted on Tuesday, August 27, 2024, at the USU Extension Office from 8:00 am to 5:00pm or Wednesday, August 27, 2025, at the County Fair Exhibit building from 8:30am to 9:50am No exhibits will be accepted after 10:00 am (Wednesday) so that judging can begin and end on time.
- 2. The following are requirements for 4-H member participation:
- 4-H members must have been in the 3rd grade through the 12th grade and at least 8 years old on **September 1, 2024**. Those who do not meet these qualifications may qualify as a Cloverbud.
- 4-H members will be allowed to enter more than one exhibit per class, but no more than one exhibit per lot within the class. Exceptions to this rule are Food Preservation (3 bottles of different fruit and three bottles of different vegetables are allowed) and Gardening (may enter two exhibits in each lot but must be different varieties).
- 4-H members will be allowed 15 total entries.

NOTE: The top county exhibits, as selected by the judges, will be taken to the Utah State Fair where they will be judged again. Top state entries will be eligible to receive one of the following premiums: an Honor rosette and \$2.00 cash award; other ribbons (blue, red, and white) will receive cash awards in smaller amounts. Each 4-H member with entries in the State Fair will receive one (1) gate admission pass to the fair.

Cloverbuds: All 4-H members in 2nd grade or younger as of September 1, 2022 will exhibit their articles in the Cloverbud section. These exhibits will receive a participation ribbon and a \$2.00 premium per exhibit. These exhibits will not be eligible for the State Fair.

Handicapped and special needs adults: These members enrolled in 4-H projects are invited to participate in the county fair and exhibit in the 4-H department. These exhibits may be eligible for the state fair.

- 3. All exhibits will be individual and represent the work of the 4-H member. Clubs may also prepare special displays, which will be judged as a single exhibit.
- 4. As a result of the various growing seasons, fruits, vegetables, and vegetable creatures do not have to compete first at the County Level. However, they must be State Level Quality.
- 5. PLEASE NOTE: 4-H members are responsible to pick up their exhibits on Tuesday, September 2, 2025, between 1:30pm- 8:30pm the day after the fair closes. This will still be inside the Exhibits Building at the county fairgrounds. Neither the Iron County Fair nor the 4-H office will be responsible for articles left at the fair after 8:30pm on Tuesday, September 2, 2025.
- 6. ENTRIES SELECTED FOR THE STATE FAIR: Will still be shuttled to the State Fair on Monday, September 1, 2025. Any freshly made food exhibits will need to be delivered to the fairgrounds Exhibit Building by 3:00pm.
- 7. County exhibits will be judged on quality of work and will be based on the individual merits of the exhibit. Utilizing the Danish judging system, all qualified exhibits entered will be awarded a blue, red or white ribbon. Premiums will be paid on all individual exhibits as follows

unless otherwise designated: Blue ribbon - \$6.00, Red ribbon - \$3.00, and White ribbon - \$1.00. Purple ribbons, indicating the exhibit has been selected for State Fair competition will receive an additional \$5.00.

- 8. The following are requirements and information for exhibits:
- Posters must be 22"x33" or smaller.
- Notebook binders must be 2 inches or smaller.
- Displays must be 4'x4' or smaller and be free-standing.
- Collection boxes must be 325 square inches or smaller for bottom measurement and glass covers must open at the top or side of the box; the glass must be secured so that glass will not move when the box is properly displayed at the fair.
- Exhibits must have a completed exhibit card attached securely to it. Exhibits with more than one part must have an exhibit card attached to each part numbered 1 of 3, 2 of 3, 3 of 3, etc.
- Food items need to be of a quality to keep more than a week without refrigeration. Frozen food products are not acceptable. Do not send food items which will spoil quickly. Bread exhibits may be made by the traditional method or with a bread machine.
- Exhibits which are normally hung on the wall must provide some means for attachment to the wall (paintings, framed items, woodworking, wall-hangings, and articles using artificial or dried flowers).
- Exhibits must be well made so they are stable enough to be moved.
- Baked products and gardening exhibits will not be returned without prior special arrangement.
- Items to be returned (hangers, pie pans, cake stands, etc.) must be marked with name of exhibitor.
- Please indicate if the item was made from a kit.
- Exhibits should not be school homework. If part of it was done in school, please include a note explaining what additional things the 4-H member did to make it into a 4-H project also.
- 9. **NOTE:** Please pick up 4-H exhibits and premium money from the exhibit building on Tuesday, September 2, 2025, 1:30pm 8:30pm.

- 2. FOUR CUPCAKES Design using at least 3 different types of decorating tips.

- 5. TWO-LAYER, CHARACTER, 3D OR DOLL using 4 or more types of decorating tips and advanced techniques. Such as drop or flat surface flowers and flowers made on a flat flower nail.
- 6. DECORATED CAKE USING STYROFOAM OR OTHER NON-EDIBLE FRAME
- 7. DECORATED CAKE USING FONDANT
- 8. CREATE YOUR OWN PROJECT suggestions include flowers made on a lily nail, figure piping, string work, tier cakes with separators and pillars.

CLASS DCC - FOOD PRESERVATION

State Recommendations for County Fair Canning: ***Many of the following requirements are based on SAFETY guidelines. ONLY those regarding presentation of exhibit or specific fair preferences are adaptable.

SPECIAL RULES FOR HOME CANNING

Canning rules are based on safe food preservation guidelines from approved sources (National Center for Home Food Preservation (NCHFP), USU Extension and Pacific Northwest Extension, USDA, and Ball Canning). See https://nchfp.uga.edu, canning.usu.edu, or www.freshpreserving.com

- 1. Only products of home kitchens are eligible.
- 2. Products entered must have been prepared (by the person entering them) since the last state/county fair. Older products will not be accepted.
- 3. All entries must be in clean, standard canning jars (e.g. no mayo jars) with new, single-use two-piece lids and rings.

- 4. A one-quart or pint jar constitutes an exhibit for fruit, vegetables or meat.
- 5. One standard-size canning jar constitutes an exhibit for preserves, conserves, pickles, and relishes based on recommendations from an approved recipe.
- 6. One pint or 1/2-pint jar with lid constitutes an exhibit for jellies and jams.
- 7. Exhibits should be canned using research-tested recipes, i.e., USDA, Ball, pectin brand name or NCHFP guidelines issued 2009 or later. Processing adjustments for altitude, time or pressure must be made and explained on entry label. Find your appropriate altitude adjustments by city: https://extension.usu.edu/sanpete/files/Utah_Altitude_Chart_by_City.pdf or contact the local USU Extension Office: 435-586-8132.
- 8. All fresh fruits, jams, jellies, pickles and relishes must be processed in a boiling water bath and properly sealed. Entries processed in a steam canner will not be accepted.
- 9. No frozen jams or wax seals will be accepted. The presence of mold disqualifies a product.
- 10. All meats and vegetables must be processed in a pressure canner.
- 11. The exhibitor is requested to loosen the ring on the jar (so judges can remove ring and examine the head space).
- 12. REQUIRED: All jars must be labeled with name of product, method (water bath or pressure), pack (hot or raw), length of processing time, pounds of pressure (if applicable), altitude, date, city, recipe source (see above) and when the dial gauge was last tested (Year) attached to the bottom of jar. If sweeteners other than sugar are used, include on label. Labels are available in advance from
